



Thank you for abiding by the following training policy. By doing this, you are helping us maintain our high standards and provide the highest quality training:

- You must pre-register for all classes. Registration forms can be found on LSCCRC's website, in our newsletter or at our office. Training registrations are on a first-come, first-served basis; register early. You are not considered to be registered for a class until payment has been received.
- Payment for a class should be made payable to Salisbury University. We gladly accept cash, check, Visa or MasterCard. There is a \$25 returned check fee. You can now register online with your Visa or MasterCard at www.training.easternshoreccrc.org
- Class registration fees are non-refundable. However, if you are unable to attend a training session, you must notify our office by close of business the day before the training in order to receive credit toward another class.

FIVE ESSENTIALS TO MEANINGFUL PLAY

From the Infant & Toddler Scene

When you think back on your childhood, what happy play memories come to mind? Adults today tend to think back on their childhood play memories with nostalgia and often call them the "good old days." Memories of joyful and meaningful play experiences help bind families together emotionally, even long after children are grown. Are our children experiencing the same kind of joy, meaning and family bonding in their play?

Here are five elements essential for meaningful play that will create those rich memories we treasure:

- 1. Children make their own decisions. When children choose how to play, they experience freedom in making those choices and they begin to see connections between the choice, the consequences and/or the results of that choice.
- Children are intrinsically motivated. This impulse to play comes naturally based on them wanting to understand the world. It is this motivation that allows them to regulate their feelings and desires in order to keep playing.
- 3. Children become immersed in the moment. In that risk-free environment, children have the security and safety to experiment, try new ideas and investigate the laws of nature. Children are fully engaged that they lose awareness of their surroundings, time and space.
- 4. Play is spontaneous, not scripted. Play is totally unplanned, but play can be planned as well. This sense of the unknown gives children opportunities to develop flexibility in their thinking and decision making, which is a vital skill.
- 5. Play is enjoyable. Play has an emotional response attached to it, and without that connection, the experience is simply an activity. Enjoyment is the direct result of engaging in play. It is FUN!
