LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

t's not every day you witness something totally amazing. LUsually you see things that are interesting, sometimes you see things that make you take a second look, but not very often do you observe something that makes you say, "Wow! That's awesome!" I watched the eclipse. That was amazing! That was awesome! That was spectacular! It was an experience I will remember all my life. It made me feel small and humble, yet it made me feel a part of something huge and important. I wanted to tell someone how I felt about experiencing three heavenly bodies lining up, even for a few minutes. Wow!

Children have experiences like this daily. They want talk to about what they saw, how something made them feel, what they would like to do next, or just share an experience. Often, they don't have the right word to use; or they can't express themselves adequately because a feeling is too large to explain; or they can't think of who would like to know, and would then take time to listen, understand and then respond suitably.

That's where you come in. Large-scale studies show that teacher-child interactions are important to the academic and social development of young children. When teachers can draw children into learning and keep them engaged, their academic outcomes are better. Children learn to have conversations: real exchanges that include listening and speaking, and sharing of thoughts and ideas,

explanations and descriptions. They acquire the vocabulary to make themselves understood. And, in a responsive and nurturing classroom, children become confident in their abilities to use language effectively.

Here are some ways to make your interactions with children valuable: Validate: Use mirror talk to show your interest and appreciation for children's efforts by saying what you see them doing. For example: "Deborah, I see that you have drawn many lines and circles on your paper." Personalize: Have conversations with children about topics that are important to them: "Marla, on Friday you were so excited about going to your cousin's birthday party. How did it go?"

Respect: Ask permission before joining in a child's activity. "James, may I sit with you while you work on your puzzle? I notice that you are

looking at each piece carefully before you decide where to put it." **Accent:** Acknowledge a child's

Accept: Acknowledge a child's emotions and coach him or her about how to manage them: "Bobby, I can tell you are very upset about Ross stepping on your sand castle. You can tell Ross how you feel. I'll go with you."

When children have a caregiver who supports their efforts, shows interest in their work and treats them courteously, they are comfortable using new vocabulary. They are confident in their ability to get their message across. And, when they witness something totally mind-boggling, they have the words to express their wonder.

Take some time to share something amazing with the children you care for.

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TRAINING POLICY

Thank you for abiding by the following training policy. By doing this, you are helping us maintain our high standards and provide the highest quality training:

- You must preregister for all classes. Registration forms can be found on LSCCRC's website, in our newsletter or at our office. Training registrations are on a first-come, first-served basis; register early. You are not considered to be registered for a class until payment has been received in our office.
- Payment for a class should be made payable to Salisbury University. We gladly accept cash, check, Visa or MasterCard. There is a \$25 returned check fee.
- Class registration fees are nonrefundable. However, if you are unable to attend a training session, you must notify our office by close of business the day before the training in order to receive credit towards another class.

- In order to ensure that all classes are conducted as scheduled, please register early. If the minimum registration requirement is not met prior to the class, it will be cancelled. We will notify all registered students of this cancellation.
- In order to get a certificate for training, an attendee will need to be present for the entire training.
- Please be on time for all trainings, as no one will be admitted late. Leaving a training early or arriving late can distract others from learning. Also, taking only a portion of a training does not allow for a participant to get a full grasp of the subject and takes away training opportunities from other providers who need the full amount of training hours.
- Although we love children at LSCCRC, please do not bring them to class with you.

- Certificates will be awarded to all participants successfully completing a class. Please keep these certificates for licensing and credentialing purposes. If you need a duplicate copy of your certificate, you will be charged \$1 per copy.
- Please check with local television stations for any possible cancellations due to bad weather. If a training is cancelled, it will be rescheduled for a later date.
- Please be respectful of the trainer and other class members. Save private conversations for break time or after class. Cell phones, including texting, can be disruptive to others. Please turn your cell phone off at the beginning of class or put it on silent. Disruptive participants will be asked to leave the class and will not be given credit for the class or a refund.

CREATING A QUIET CORNER

NEWS FROM THE EARLY CHILDHOOD MENTAL HEALTH DESK


Quiet corners are a safe, quiet space in your home or within a classroom that may be used by children needing to self-monitor their behavior, emotions and/or attention. A quiet corner, as indicated by its name, is a place to take a quiet break, gather one's own thoughts and emotions, until he/she is ready to rejoin the family and/or classroom.

Below are a few ideas/suggestions for a quiet corner:

- Utilize a corner, away from busy zones within the home or classroom
- Set up an open tent or a corner with pillows
- Provide a few stuffed animals
- Soft lightening
- Have children's books regarding self-regulation

- A basket of fidgets (fidget spinner, click cubes, Rubik's cube, squeeze balls, etc.)
- Mood faces with labels describing various moods (to discuss feelings upon entry and exit of the space)
- Utilize a timer (2-5 minute sand timers work beautifully)
- Create a glitter bottle/calm down jar
- Use a breathing ball

Using a quiet corner is a gift to the parent(s), caregiver(s), teacher(s) and child(ren). A quiet corner provides a safe space for children to self-monitor and self-regulate. Moreover, it provides the adult(s) an opportunity to redirect the unwelcomed behavior or emotion and take a quick break as the role model.



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

There are many changes coming to the Child and Adult Care Food Program!

Starting October 1, 2017, the new USDA Meal Patterns take effect. USDA recently revised the CACFP meal patterns to ensure children and adults have access to healthy, balanced meals throughout the day. Under the new child and adult meal patterns, meals served will include a greater variety of vegetables and fruit, more whole grains, and less added sugar and saturated fat. If you are a family child care provider participating under The Planning Council's sponsorship, beginning October 1, 2017, providers will no longer be able to use bubble menus to record their meals. Family child care providers will now be required to use the online system,

KidKare, to claim meals for their program.

To help ease this transition, The Planning Council asks that providers use the training website offered by KidKare: https://kidkare. knowledgeowl.com/help. Providers may sign up for a live webinar or watch the many instructional videos on how to navigate and make the most of using KidKare. LSCCRC Technical Assistance Coordinator Jordon Helgason is also willing to help you review the instructional videos and navigate the system.
