Happy summer everyone!

Summer is the time of year when things move a little slower, we can take some rest and relaxation, and the fun goes on until dark. You can make plans, dream dreams and evaluate your accomplishments.

There is also time to reflect on what you've learned over the academic year and envision a plan for growth and learning in the fall. How is your professional development going? Have you logged all the training hours you need? Consider checking out the July-September ESCCRC training calendar, which you can find in this flyer and on the training page of our website. There are MSDE-required classes and elective classes offered every month. A highlight this quarter is a Super Saturday training scheduled in September at the Wye Mills location, called "Loose Parts Extravaganza." Are you ready to continue your education at a college or university? If you have an associate degree, it's possible your credit hours will transfer and speed up your progress toward a bachelor's degree. If you do not, there are early childhood degree programs in Maryland, including Chesapeake College, Wor-Wic Community College and Salisbury University, that accept an MSDE-sponsored grant program called the Child Care Career and Professional Development Fund (CCCPDF). Take some time to check them out and see how your schedule fits and call us about the details.

Maybe you've been out of school for a while and you'd like to work on your Child Development Associate (CDA). The CDA bills itself as "the best first step" toward learning the basics to be successful in the early childhood field. It is a nationally recognized credential that evaluates classwork, practical experience and knowledge of child development which culminates in a well-respected credential



that you'll be proud to have.

Any choice you make to further your early childhood education improves your performance in child care programs. Contact this office or talk to your coach. ESCCRC staff are always glad to talk about supporting you in continuing your education because it's always a very good idea.

This quarter there is a Business Foundations Series especially created for family child care providers. You will learn about taxes, contracts, marketing, managing records and more. There are two sessions each week for four weeks full of great information to build and sustain your child care business. To register, please call us.



NEWS FROM THE INFANT AND TODDLER SCENE Loose Parts in the Infant Setting

Encouraging loose parts in infant environments can be beneficial for babies' development. This kind of exploration allows them to engage their senses and fosters cognitive and physical growth. However, safety is of the greatest importance. Constant supervision during loose parts explorations is essential to ensure infants' safe and active engagement (Daly & Beloglovsky 2016).

Because mouthing is expected as infants explore the materials in their environments, it is crucial to select materials that are appropriate in size and free from harmful substances on their coatings or finishes (Daly & Beloglovsky 2016). Teachers can use a choking tester or cardboard paper towel tube to test materials' sizes to ensure they are safe.

Transparent, colorful scarves can ignite an infant's visual curiosity. Items like jar lids, wooden or plastic cups, wooden or metal bowls, and boxes offer a diverse range of sensory experiences, from sound to texture to spatial awareness. Sensory bottles can appeal to and engage infants with their visual and auditory stimuli. Larger wooden rings, napkin holders and similar objects promote fine motor skills through grasping and manipulation.

TIPS FOR ACCESSING HIGH-QUALITY PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

To reduce the risk of having training credit rejected by licensing or the MSDE Credential program, access training through the links provided on our website.

Thank you for abiding by the following training policy. By doing this, you are helping us maintain our high standards

- You must pre-register for all classes. Registration forms can be found on ESCCRC's website, in our newsletter or at our office. Training registrations are on a first-come, first-served basis; register early. You are not considered to be registered for a class until payment has been received.
- Payment for a class should be made payable to Salisbury University. We gladly accept cash, check, Visa or MasterCard. There is a \$25 returned check fee. You can now register online with your Visa or MasterCard at www.training.easternshoreccrc.org
- Class registration fees are non-refundable. However, if you
 are unable to attend a training session, you must notify our
 office by close of business the day before the training or the
 full price of the training will be charged to your account.
- In order to ensure that all classes are conducted as scheduled, please register early. If the minimum registration requirement is not met prior to the class, it will be canceled. We will notify all registered students of this cancelation.

and provide the highest quality training:

- In order to get a certificate for training, an attendee will need to be present for the entire training. Complete an assessment and evaluation and turn it in — This allows the ESCCRC to maintain funding as your CCRC and training hub.
 ATTENTION: In order to provide your certificate in a reasonable amount of time, you must submit your Assessment and Evaluation. No certificate will be sent if a completed assessment and evaluation is received after one month from training date.
- Please be on time for all trainings, as no one will be admitted late. Leaving a training early or arriving late can distract others from learning. Also, taking only a portion of a training does not allow for a participant to get a full grasp of the subject and takes away training opportunities from other providers who need the full amount of training hours.
- Although we love children at ESCCRC, please do not bring them to class with you.

- Certificates will be awarded to all participants successfully completing all requirements of a class. Please keep these certificates for licensing and credentialing purposes.
 This is your professional responsibility!
- Please check with local television stations for any possible cancelations due to bad weather. If a training is canceled, it will be rescheduled for a later date. The Resource Center is closed if Salisbury University is closed.
- Please be respectful of the trainer and other class members. Save private conversations for break time or after class. Cell phones, including texting, can be disruptive to others. Please turn your cell phone off at the beginning of class or put it on silent. Disruptive participants will be asked to leave the class and will not be given credit for the class or a refund.

How to File a Program Complaint

If you believe a particular child care program is in violation of state child care licensing laws or regulations, you may file an official complaint against that program. To file a complaint, contact the Regional Licensing Office covering the county where the program is located.
